Our featured speaker today was **Jeff Perrin** who discussed the Kentucky Derby. Jeff is a jockey's agent who works to arrange riding opportunities for the jockey he represents. He was born in Australia where horse racing is wildly popular and a staple of weekend activity – where having a beer with your mates is a regular Saturday event.

Jeff is the agent for jockey Sonny Leon who rode Rich Strike to the 148th Kentucky Derby victory in 2022. We saw a video highlighting the shocking win by Rich Strike – at race time an 80-1 long shot in the 20 horse field.

Rich Strike was purchased in a claiming race at Churchill Downs for \$30,000. The horse's mother was a Canadian turf champion and Rich Strike was originally raced on turf – with poor results. A move to Churchill downs and entry into the claiming race changed everything.

Rich Strike was not even entered in the Derby until the day before the race – having been on the alternate list until that time. Rich Strike's accumulated points left the horse just short of the qualification threshold. Jeff, whose career as a jockey's agent began at Beulah Park in Grove City, pointed out that there are over 60,000 horses foaled every year – but only around 20 ultimately qualify for the Kentucky Derby. The field is winnowed via a series of prep races for three year olds which, through a points system, determine qualifiers for the Derby. The Kentucky Derby is the only race of the Triple Crown series that requires the accumulation of points in order to qualify. Neither the Belmont nor the Preakness have such restrictions.

The Kentucky Derby is 1.25 miles – a distance that none of the entrants have run before. The importance of the pole position depends to an extent on the nature of the horse and its running style. Most trainers do not want the one or two position unless they have a speed horse. Rich Strike had some advantage in the Derby because the horse regularly trained and raced at Churchill Downs while the others had not. In addition, Rich Strike is a "deep closer" which is advantageous over the additional length of the Derby.

In a 1.25 mile race the distance difference between the pole position and the outside slot is about 40 yards.

Jockey compensation is ten percent of the owner's share. The Derby has the largest purse of the Triple Crown races while the Belmont Stakes has the smallest.

### JEFF PERRIN KENTUCKY DERBY

In some cases jockeys will ride multiple races and horses in the same day – sometimes at different race track depending on the schedule at each track. In the case of the Kentucky Derby, riders often have ridden several other races earlier in the day.

Jeff feels that horses today are not as durable as those in the past. The specific reason cannot be determined but diet and breeding may well be factors. While today's horses may be thinner boned they still must hold up to 1,200 pounds of pressure with each stride – when all of the horse's weight is on only one leg and ankle at a time.

Jeff currently represents three jockeys in two states. Sonny Leon, winning jockey in the 2022 Kentucky Derby, is currently racing in Florida.


