Colleen Marshall is a local news reporter who has worked at NBC4 for 40 years. Colleen shared her story about being a reporter and her passion for seeking to do factual and unbiased news.

Colleen has won 8 Emmys and one national award for her outstanding news stories. She is the news anchor on the NBC4evening news and has a news show on Sunday mornings named The Spectrum Show. She volunteers on many boards and is also a lawyer which brings an added dimension to her reporting.

Colleen spoke about the 2 major changes in journalism industry: the enormous changes in technology and the audience.

Technology has changed reporting incredibly in the past 40 years, and particularly in the past 10 years with an enormous development of new equipment including cell phones, cameras and microphones. Today with most people having cell phones with cameras, news can be captured by almost anyone who is at the right place at the right time. Having the general population involved with recording the news leads reporters to include audio and video recorded on people's phones like no other time in reporting. The cameras are very high tech and more easily record in all kinds of situations and environments. Microphones are much improved and can record audio and sounds at a much farther distance. The news media has gone from reelto-reel cameras to high tech recordings and cell phone videos.

The audience is the second major change in news reporting. The audience used to be centered around a certain time of day when news was shown on television, particularly the evening news. Families planned their evenings around finishing dinner and gathering around the television for the evening news. Walter Cronkite was known as the face of the evening news for many years. People trusted Walter and other news reporters to provide the news as factual and on time. People listened to their radios for daily news updates and breaking news information. There was a genuine trust that the news was being reported factually and genuinely.

Today's audience has changed as people can get news all day long from various sources. The audience now decides when, what and where they get the news. People use cell phones and computers to get news information any time of day all 24 hours a day. The evening news is still watched but is no longer the main source of the news. And there is a larger distrust of media sources as most news sources seem to be biased by political views. People can watch news channels that are more in line with their political views.

Colleen has worked with many reporters over the years, reporting on important local news stories. She works with investigative reporters, like Isabel

Journalism still matters--especially in local news. Colleen is a political reporter in Columbus and seeks to gather the most factual and most relevant stories about the local and state politicians so that she can give that information to the constituents who will be voting. She believes that most local news reporting is factual and not biased, providing accurate, fair and timely local news.

Colleen shared how much reporting daily stories has changed as reporters use to have all day to develop, research and write their news stories. Now they need to report live on the air as the story is developing. There is a great deal of stress on getting the facts, all of the perspectives and getting the news out to the public first.

When asked how long she will continue to work as a local reporter, she shared that her contract ends in 2 years and she will consider her future at that time...... But there is always just one more story.

Brian Bainbridge introduced visiting Rotarian Jon Jaynes who will likely be transferring his membership to our club.




