John Krauss introduced the speaker: **Ashley Lester**, Senior Project Manager at Columbus Downtown Development Corporation. A graduate of OSU, Ashley's current job is to work on the development and promotion of the new National Veteran's Memorial & Museum that is being built on the old Vets Memorial site, near downtown, on the Scioto Peninsula. The NVMM is scheduled to open in spring/summer 2018.

The NVMM's mission is to:

- **HONOR** Americans' contributions through military service
- **CONNECT** civilians with veterans and their military experience
- **INSPIRE** visitors to serve their community and nation as citizens and
- **EDUCATE** school children about the history and value of service via an interactive permanent exhibition. Additionally, the space will host events for active duty and retired military members, including homecoming ceremonies, ROTC trainings and graduations, celebrations, and parades.

The NVMM arose out of the City of Columbus and Franklin County developing a land-use plan for the Scioto Peninsula. CDDC is Project Manager, overseeing architectural firm Allied Works, landscape architect OLIN, museum exhibit design firm Ralph Applebaum Associates, and construction services firm Turner Construction. There is an Advisory Committee of veterans which had been headed by the late John Glenn.

As stated on the NVMM website, there will be a concrete arch structure with a glass curtainwall system, featuring a spiral processional rising to a rooftop sanctuary. The sanctuary, which will also be accessible from inside of the building, is envisioned to be a civic room designed for ceremonies, celebrations, and reflection. With more than 50,000 square feet, the Museum will feature a Great Hall, providing views of the Scioto River, as well as a space for gatherings and public events. The Exhibition Galleries will follow the curve of the concrete rings, and the experience will conclude with an interactive media experience in the heart of the building. A second floor mezzanine will feature

a Memorial Room to honor fallen veterans, and a lower level will incorporate a Rotating Exhibition Gallery and interpretive classrooms and meeting rooms. There will also be a Memorial Grove, designed as a place for reflection so that visitors can pause to think about what they have experienced

in the Museum. At the center of a circular path will be a grove of trees, symbolizing reflection and designating this area as a sacred place to honor and memorialize veterans. At the end of the path will be a stone wall featuring a reflecting pool at the base and three areas where water will cascade over the wall.

The Meeting

Chris Reinke gave the invocation and led the pledge of allegiance.

There were no visiting Rotarians.

Linda Cummins introduced our guest **Shirley-Brooks Jones**, who had spoken at Rotary Roundtable and described her experience on 9/11. Her flight from Europe that day was diverted to the airport at Gander, in Newfoundland, Canada, along with many other flights. The local people provided the passengers with food, lodging and hospitality for 3 days, on a moment's notice, and refused to take payment. Subsequently, Shirley and other passengers created a scholarship fund at The Columbus Foundation which has provided scholarship awards for students from that area for 15 years.
