Debbie Johnson introduced **Dr. Kathy Krendl**, the 20th president of Otterbein University. She is the first woman to lead the University. She previously served at Ohio University and Indiana University. She teaches in the area of women in leadership.

Otterbein has always been an innovative school. Otterbein was founded in 1847 and was the first institution in the country founded as a coed school. Women were on the original facility, and the first grads were women.

Otterbein showed an early interest in engaging other cultures by sending students and faculty to Sierra Leone in the 1850's to develop schools and literacy facilities. Otterbein admitted African American students before the Civil War, and admitted Japanese-American students from internment

camp in World War II. An Otterbein ad from Time magazine in 1968 emphasized the school's coed history and culture, independent thinking, creative thought, and church foundation.

Otterbein adopted integrated core studies in 1969 so that students could understand how different people think differently. It also emphasizes experiential learning where students apply their knowledge to specific situations.

The innovation has continued since Kathy became president of Otterbein in 2009. In 2010 the University added the Five Cardinal Experiences to the learning experience: global engagement internships, research, community engagement, and leadership. This program allows students to apply their skills in a real world setting and prepare for the

job market. A student's experiential transcript lists what the student has done in each of these areas, and the student takes that with them after graduation.

Kathy led a 3 year review of students, staff and the community which led to a mission statement emphasizing a model community and a unique approach to integrating direct experience into all learning. Cores values include diversity, equality, inclusiveness, lifelong learning, opportunity, service, and sustainability. Otterbein has made special financial arrangements with 4 school districts, including Columbus public, to encourage and enable students from those districts to attend and graduate from Otterbein.

Otterbein has created The Point at Otterbein, a new STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) Innovation Center, and will be starting an integrated mechanical engineering program this fall. The Center will be unique in the way it serves students, the community, and businesses and brings them together. Students from different

academic programs will team up with faculty and business partners on various projects. The Center contains a variety of facilities including a metal shop, wood shop, rapid prototyping facility, design studio, and academic labs with 3-D printers. Nestle has a dedicated lab in the Center. One third of the building is finished, with more phases to come. The space is open and collaborative to encourage sharing. One anchor tenant is edgeThingZ, which is developing simulation devices that can be used to train nursing students much more cost effectively. The Center also contains food and coffee services and a welcoming outdoor area for students and others to congregate. Otterbein is working with government, schools, and businesses to see how else the Center can be used. There will be STEAM-Powered summer camps starting this summer.

Otterbein has not had demonstrations about speakers. Students have expressed concerns about some speakers, but so far there have not been any disruptions.
