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**Mary Ann Krauss** introduced today's speaker, **Jennifer Noll**. Jennifer is Senior Planner at the Mid Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC). She has a Master's degree in City Planning from Ohio State.

The focus of Jennifer's presentation was on a current project called "Insight 2050" which focuses on development and population trends in the region leading up to the year 2050. This 30+ year look forward will help inform the region's leaders about how to plan appropriately. A slide presentation served as the basis for her remarks.

The study (Insight 2050) was launched three years ago. Prior to its launch other studies had predicted how the Columbus region would grow. In 2010 it was estimated that population would increase by 500,000 people by 2050. When numbers came in for 2015 there had already been an increase of 115,000. Given this trend it now appears that the 500,000 increase will be reached by 2029 – fully 20 years before initial projections. Further, if the trend continues we will see an increase of 1,000,000 people by 2050.

Jennifer pointed out that not all of the growth will be from new people moving in from outside the region.

Current residents will have longer life spans and current households/families will be growing over time.

Demographics of the growing population will also be different than in the past. From 1980-2010 the region also added 500,000 people. Most of that growth was from baby boomers in the 35 to 54 year age bracket.

From 2010 until about 2040 there will be a shift in this demographic. Most of the growth will be concentrated in the 65+ age group and in the 16-34 age bracket. One note to be taken from this fact is that a substantial number of these households will be childless.

The growth of the 65+ population – as well as the influx of younger residents – calls for consideration of things such as transportation infrastructure, the proximity of vital services, the size of available housing units and the expectations of more diversity in the community.

There are currently about 34,500 people in Upper Arlington. Jennifer did not have population projections for UA but did note that 17% of current residents are over 65 years of age. This percentage is expected to increase to about 33% by 2050.
