Alan Yarletts led today's program about the UA Rotary Interact Club and the Next Generations Committee. Alan quickly pointed out that the club's successes have been the result of efforts by Rotarians who have stepped up to the plate to drive the program forward. Ned Clark, Jim McGovern, Angela Lanctot and Herb Gillen have taken leadership/advisory roles in UA schools.

The primary focus of Interact is to help students develop a focus on gratitude and appreciation for the opportunities they have and the situation in which they live. Rotary's Four Way Test comes into play also. It is gratifying to see the students' growth and their interest in service as they work on club projects.

Alan mentioned Bed Brigade builds and bed deliveries, Santa's Silent Helper, food service at the YWCA Family Center and preparing and distributing sandwiches for Ronald McDonald House as four examples of high school Interact projects.

During his year as UA Rotary president, Ned Clark asked Alan to consider taking on the Interact program. In its first year the high school club had 5 members at the outset and ended up with 17 members by the end of the year. There are currently 44 UAHS students in Interact. There is a cap of 50 members.

Interact middle school programs were started in the second year. Ned became our representative for the program at Jones and Jim McGovern stepped up for Hastings. Alan is currently attempting to launch programs at UA's elementary schools. That project is on hold until a new superintendent is in place. The establishment of programs in the middle schools, and ultimately in the elementary schools, will begin to provide a feeder system for the high school program – making the transition from one level to the next smoother.

The high school club has done as many as 50 community service projects in a year. The COVID pandemic slowed that number considerably. During that slowdown club members mounted a food drive for needy families.

We saw slides highlighting the clubs and some of their activities.

Angela Lanctot is a co-representative with Alan at the high school. She mentioned the Ronald McDonald House sandwich project, Honor Flight, Meals On Wheels, Holiday Happiness at the library, cards for memory care residents at First Community Village and Senior Service Saturday as key projects for the club. The Honor Flight project seems to be the most impactful to the students.

Jim McGovern works with Interact members at Hastings Middle School. He focuses on trying to put the service bug in the students. The club currently consists of 7th and 8th grade students. There are 10-12 kids from each grade currently involved. Plans are being considered to begin bringing in 6th grade students in the second half of the year. School counselors will be resource for 6th grade student membership recommendations. Students write cards for nursing home residents, work on My Very Own Blanket projects and write on various topics. Middle schoolers are more limited in the types of projects they can take on since they are more reliant on other family members for transportation, etc.

Ned Clark co-represents the club along with Herb Gillen at Jones Middle School. The club currently has 50+ members – about 35 of whom are active participants. Their projects and activities are similar to those at Hastings. Ned noted that the social aspects of Interact participation are important components of the program. The clock had ticked measurably past 1:00 PM so Ned abbreviated his comment lest there be a wholesale rush for the exits.
