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# **ON THE WEB**



Brendan King introduced Kristin Greenberg, Executive Director of the UA Historical Society. Kristin presented and discussed slides which took a look back 100 years and what we would have found in Upper Arlington in 1924.

UA Historical Society's mission features three key points: Discover, Preserve and Celebrate. The Society works in cooperation with the UA Public Library to make information and resources available to the public at the library's uaarchives.org.

Kristin referred to the UA History Walk at Northam Park as a source of information for community members. She shared a growth map which depicted the various growth points for the city over the decades. The History Walk presents information about these developments.

In 1924 OSU football coach John Wilce lived on Tremont Road. He might have been reading The Community News which was a weekly newspaper produced for the Tri Village area (UA, Grandview and Marble Cliff). The paper was produced at First Community Church and included a gossip column.

The papers at that time (1924) included ads for the Upper Arlington Company which was managing the development of the new community. There were about 300 homes in Upper Arlington at that time.

The ads offered only single family homes and growth was slow but steady. Among the original deed restrictions we would find requirements for green space, parks and building setbacks. Kristin noted that restrictions focused on who could live in the community did not begin to appear until

The addition of the large tract of land south of Lane Avenue which came to be known as the University District originally included ownership restricted to people who worked for Ohio State University.

In 1924, what is now Miller Park Library was the village hall. The building also doubled as the sales office for the Upper Arlington Company. It was also a trolley stop for folks heading into downtown Columbus.

The developing school system in Upper Arlington featured the brand new Jones School - named for its first principal. The new school only had students in the first through sixth grades when it opened. The building opened on March 17, 2024. Older UA students attended class in a log building which had been moved from its original location near Miller Park to land which is now occupied by Devon pool. Interestingly, students who wanted to graduate from high school had to finish their high school years in Grandview. The first class of students to graduate from Upper Arlington high school did so in 1925. This makes the UAHS class of 2024 the 100th graduating class for the community.

There were originally four rural schools in the area which ultimately fell within UA's footprint.

Those schools were consolidated into the new Fishinger Elementary School. (now Wellington School.)

Field Day was a Tri Village event held each summer and was the precursor to the UA Fourth of July parade and festivities. In 1924 enthusiasm was fading a bit for Field Day and on June 27, 1924 Upper Arlington announced its first plans for an Independence Day celebration.

There was discussion of a merger between Upper Arlington, Grandview Heights and Marble Cliff in 1924. The negotiations were lengthy and eventually became contentious. Financial consideration and potential cost efficiencies were among the issues discussed by the parties. Kristin did not elaborate on the entire list of issues which ultimately scuttled the merger talk.

Kristin noted that the UA Historical Society focuses on the guide words Engaging and Relevant. The organization is striving to remain relevant and is always looking for new members.
