

Brad DeHays introduced our speaker today **Tom Stalf** who is the president and CEO of our Columbus Zoo. Tom brought some animals for us and he talked about what's new at the zoo including some of the new exhibits that they are getting ready to launch this year.

Tom thanked us for volunteering by being part of Rotary. At the Columbus Zoo they have hundreds of docents and volunteers and there have been opportunities where groups of volunteers can help. For example, someone must take all those lights down and put them up. This year they had nearly 500,000 people at the zoo for wild lights in 50 days which makes July the second most popular month of attendance. You would think June, July and August would be very popular. They are but not as popular as December.

This is Tom's 30th year in the zoo business. He worked with Jack Hanna back in 1995 and would bring the animals on stage. He came here after running a zoo in northwest Illinois for 20 years. This is his 10th year at the Columbus Zoo which he's been running for the last 8 years. Before he was CEO and president, he also ran the Wilds in Zanesville. They have built some overnight stay options at the Wilds including cabins and tents that you can stay in.

He shared some World News with us that will be featured on Fox and Friends on April 8. They will have the new young cheetah cubs on the show. There are only 7,000 cheetahs left in Africa and they are in deep trouble because their habitat has been fragmented. They can't just go in the grasslands and meet other cheetahs. The zoo has been working with scientists at the Smithsonian National Zoo for 19 years on in vitro fertilization of big cats. They now have two healthy cheetah cubs; one male, one female, and this is a big deal. This one way the zoo works for sustainability and making a difference for conservation.

The Columbus Zoo attracts 3 million guests every year. They have a \$320 million economic impact annually to our community. They have 114 different projects in and around the world in 46 different countries. They raise millions of dollars for those facilities. Last year, they were able to contribute \$230 million to field conservation all around the world.

At the Zoo they believe that if they can bring animals to you and tell you about their special characteristics that you'll fall in love with them and then maybe you'll be inspired by them and will want to support animal welfare in any way you can have. This year the Zoo will be opening Adventure Cove which will feature seals and sea lions as well as some animals he brought with him today. In Adventure Cove none of the animals will be doing tricks. They're not going to be bouncing beach balls on their noses at the sea lion area. They will be doing what they do naturally.

First, we saw a Bush Baby. A Bush Baby is a pro Simeon which is an early primate found in Africa. They're a nocturnal animal that's arboreal so they're active at night and mainly in the trees. We watched the Bush Baby jump from one staff member to another and back again. In the wild they jump from tree to tree looking for bugs which makes them great pollinators. They'll get the pollen on their fur and as they jump from tree to tree and plant to plant, they'll pollinate just like our bees and insects.

PRESIDENT & CEO - COLUMBUS ZOO



Next was Kevin who is a Seriana which is a type of bird of prey. He demonstrated a natural behavior using a little rubber lizard. In the wild they'll catch reptiles, and since they don't want to be bitten by anything venomous, they'll grab it, and then they'll slam it on a rock.

Our third animal was a two toed sloth. There are two types of sloths in the world: two toed and three toed. As you'd expect, two toed sloths have two toes and three toed sloths have three toes. In addition, a three toed sloth is much larger, it's a marble color and it has a black mask. A two toed sloth is a brownish color. Everything that a sloth does is very slow. They use those toes to hang upside down. Their hair is wiry starts at their chest and goes down. When it's raining, it repels the water, so they don't get all soggy and wet. It just rolls right off them. At night, they find a little crevice, and they'll sit and be very, very quiet. Just once a week, they'll come down off their tree and go away from their tree to go to the bathroom. They do that so the jaguar doesn't smell where they live. They're very good swimmers. And if they must go across the river or across the lake, they can easily do that.

Tom shared some slides of the new construction at the Zoo. At Adventure Cove, there will be indoor and outdoor areas where you can bring your family and do a VIP experience like a birthday party. You'll have the opportunity to see not only the sloths or flying servals jumping in the air but all of the great characteristics that make the animal world amazing.

The Adventure Cove is a 400,000-gallon sea lion area. They have a total of 20 sea lions and some harbor seals. They built this facility just like the manatee facility so that if they need to bring in animals that are injured, they can rehab in the facility and then be released in the wild. This will be at the front of the zoo. One of the first things that they heard from guests was it's a big parking lot. And it takes a long time to get from the parking lot to see their first animal. They wanted to give an experience right away. It's right next to the gift shop.

There is underwater viewing as well as the opportunity to see the animals above water. There is also a glass area with 360-degree viewing. The animals

will swim below you, to the side of you and above you. A great thing about the design of this exhibit is every hour there'll be a sea lion and seal display or presentation. And when they're not doing their presentation to show you what seals and sea lions can do, some of the other animals will use the same pool.

They have a brand-new sting ray bay which will now be free to visit. They are also building a new education building which is also at the front of the zoo. And they are in the design phase for a new orangutan area.

They are hosting a national conference this year that will bring in 4,500 delegates from around the world that will spend a week at the convention center downtown, and then a day at the zoo. They're working on a tram transportation system throughout the entire zoo so you can just get on a tram and you don't have to walk the seven miles as you're walking around.

They are looking at putting in a couple of tunnels or bridges so there will be more access than just the current one that goes from the east side to the west side. They're going to be remodeling the Congo expedition. The gorilla area will be remodeled, and they will be bringing in some meerkats, and a new aquarium in Australia.

At the zoo they have 11,000 animals and 2,500 employees. Their operating budget is \$105 million a year. It's a real big nonprofit. Eighty of the employees are animal trainers. They only use positive reinforcement; they never ask the animals to do anything they don't want to do. They're given treats that they want in addition to their normal diet, and they love being around people.

This year they expect to see 2.4 million guests at the Zoo, nearly 500,000 people at the waterpark, 46,000 rounds of golf at Safari and 125,000 folks at the Wilds. They can accommodate 70 people every single night at the Wilds which are open year-round for the cabins and tents.
